





It is time to express Hawaiian ways of healing and reslience in the world! The Mālama 'Ohana Working Group of the Hawai'i State Office of Wellness and Resilience has researched the complex issues of the Child Welfare Services and found profound areas of need. This is why we are hosting the 'Aha Ho'oponopono (Invitation Only) here on campus (June 5-6). Three areas of focus will be designed: Micro (self + family); Mezzo (community + agencies); Macro (systems, law + policy). February 18 found us in Punalu'u listening to Ka'ai'ai Paglinawan share insights on Ho'opono; Lahela Kruse share her ho'oponopono work in the prisons, and Shelly May describing the Mea 'Uwao curriculum they are piloting in 6 DOE Schools. We closed with Callie Naholowa'a describing a process that would organize haku and mea 'uwao to help our families in the ways they need. Aunty is also teaching a class at UH Mānoa this summer to keep these ideas moving forward.

Maima Koro - Research Fellow from Tokelau + Samoa, working on her PhD in Australia on Ethical Dilemmas of Geopolitics in Oceania, came to share 'ike aloha during the planting of an uluniu - coconut grove – at the muliwai of Ulupō in Kailua. The day was led by Nalamaku Ahsing and the Niu Now Team: Indrajit, Kehau and Jesse. Her coming inspired many to re-think the inside meaning of words like "security," "ethics," and "abundance." Maima spoke at the East West Center @ UHM on the topic of safety in Oeania and felt inspired by the work we are doing here at UH West Oahu, and in Hawai'i. Her waewaetapu (first time) found her also participating in a transformative evaluation class (40+ students) looking at similar ethical issues. Her work continues to inspire and direct people, communities and agencies throughout moana-nui-ākea. She was thrilled with our food security work with the Tree of Life.

Three Niu Muskateers: Jesse, Indrajit, Kehau!

Kupu ka niu kupu ke kanaka! When coconuts grow, humanity flourishes! This was certainly the case on Saturday, March 1st at the muliwai of Ulupo when a group of niunates gathered to welcome and plant a special collection of niu from the West Side of Oahu (Waianae + Nanakuli). These niu were collected by UHWO Alumni, Jesse and Kehau and placed in their Niu Nursery at Waianae Comp. All 90 niu were ready after 10 months and then gifted to Ulupō to be planted in the lands cleared by the Kauluakalana gang of Kailua (<u>https://www.kauluakalana.org/</u>)

KAULUAKALANA is a community-based, non-profit 501(c)(3) organization that was founded in 2019 by kama 'āina of Kailua, those who have been raised by the lands and leaders of their ahupua 'a to chart and navigate a course leading to kanaka (people) and 'āina (land) reunited in a relationship that feeds us physically, intellectually, culturally, and spiritually. Traveling in the wake of those who came before, we are committed to 'āina restoration and education, cultural revitalization, community regeneration, identity reclamation, and the renewal of kuleana in Kailua, one of the most storied ahupua 'a on O'ahu.
