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'Aha Ao Pulapula

Haku Hoʻoponopono Recognition Ceremony For the Haumana of Aunty Lynette Kaopuiki Paglinawan Waialua, Molokai: May 2-4, 2024





A unique and intentional ritual to honor the haku hoʻoponopono haumana of Aunty Lynette Kaopuiki Kahekili Paglinawan occured in May on the island of Molokai. Aunty Lynette had been working with a group of Native Hawaiian female lawyers for five years (via Zoom) on hoʻoponopono practices, values and systems, and we spent 3 days together marking the lessons and acknowledging the work ahead. The project was sponsored by the Native Hawaiian Bar Association through the vision of Yuklin Aluli, Esquire. The 'Aha Ao Pulapula was supported by the Indigenous Restorative Justice Project - Life Comes From It, and the Pu'uhonua Society. Mahalo nui to Dr. Lilinoe Bassett for her home, and cultural practitioners Ipo and Kunani Nihipali of Molokai.







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Niu Now @ Festival of the Pacific! June 6-16, 2024

Thousands of Pacific Island peoples participated in large and small events, villages, conferences, talks, presentations, performances, lunches, fashion shows, art, literature readings, dances and cultural gatherings at the Hawai'i Convention Center. This is why we held our Niu Now events during this time – we knew our Oceanic cousins would be there to share their 'ike niu – coconut knowledge! UH West Oahu played a significant role in putting this agroforestry, food security, and cultural rejuvenation effort via "Niu Now" events, thanks to the support of our Chancellor, many of our students, alumni, faculty and staff. Here is where radical collaboration within ancient sensibilities is solidified and expanded. Fiji, Samoa, Tonga, Solomon Islands, Papua New Guinea, Tuvalu, Rarotonga, Hawaii, Kiribati, and other unique Island Nations gathered around the "Whole of Life" curriculum directed by Reverend Professor Upolu Luma Vaai of the Pacific Theological College (soon to become Pacific Community University) in Suva, Fiji. 34 mature PhD and post PhD students gathered for 2 weeks with profound teachings and experiences in rural Fijian Villages and with Heads of State to share Indigenous insights on development, spirituality and climate change issues. It was a truly and deeply profound experience for every single participant. We are changed with the quality of our collective truth.

He begins his job in September 2024, and we are all excited and grateful that he can fulfill this vital and timely position. Dr. Noa Lincoln of UH Mānoa supervised Indrajit for his thesis: *Identification and Preservation of the Hawaiian 'Niu Hiwa' within Hawai'i's Coconut Diversity.* Look for Indrajit in the Fall as he is housed here on campus for his coconut work! We send you off into your next journey with aloha!









Indrajit is from Southern Sri Lanka with over 3, 000 years of coconut knowledge. He brings this depth of wisdom to his new role as Coordinator of Coconuts for the state of Hawai'i. He spent 10 years in the Financial Aid Departments at KCC and here at UHWO. He co-founded Niu Now, a grassroots effort dedicated to "niu as a relationship rooted in community and aloha 'āina". He has produced Niu Nurseries that gifted 2,000+ healthy niu seedlings to community and created 25+ uluniu (coconut groves) on O'ahu, Molokai, Maui and Lanai. Indrajit is our kumu niu – our beloved teacher of 'ike niu.





Now is the time for radical awareness and effulgent coherence that includes Indigenous insights linked to the care of land/sky/waterways, transformative evaluation, and enlightened pedagogy. Rethinking and Reshaping Evaluation Criteria: Lessons in Contexts from the Pacific Islands



Building on Patton's (2021) call for a more transformative evaluation approach, we raise reflective questions on the relationships between evaluation criteria and local contexts by learning from evaluations conducted in the Pacific Islands. We seek to surface ideas from evaluations conducted in the Pacific Islands that might help shape an agenda for future discussions on learning from evaluation criteria at the system-level. Key areas of focus of the paper include: the need to define system-level capacities and how they can be sustained, the importance of clarifying models of system-level learning in a congested project landscape, the need for criteria for transformation, and the need to help organizations develop differentiated strategies. The paper raises questions to help plan and evaluate interventions and systems to promote contextually-sensitive practice and connect this to evaluation criteria.
