Spring 2011 Elementary Education Graduates Exit Survey Results

There were 18 teacher candidates that graduated in Spring 2011. The following results represent 17 candidates who completed an exit survey.

Transferred credit

Students transferred an average of 79.7 credits to UHWO. The range was 59-151 credits.

Semesters to graduation, full-time, part-time

Students on average took 12.1 semesters to graduate with a B.Ed. The range was 5-17 semesters (one student calculated the number of semesters to earn a B.Ed after a first bachelor's degree was conferred). Students attended classes on a full-time and part-time basis. The average number of semesters classified as a full-time student (≥12 credits in a semester) was 7.6; the range was 3-14. Conversely, the average number of semesters classified as a part-time student (less than 12 credits) was 4.6; the range was 3-14.

Work and school

15 students responded that they worked while attending classes. Four students worked full-time and eight students worked part-time. The remaining three students indicated they had worked both full-time and part-time during their studies. Nine students responded that they worked during their student teaching semester. Of those students, the average number of hours worked during student teaching was 17.3; the range was 8-30 hours per week.

The candidates were asked to respond (using a five-point Likert Scale) how well-prepared they felt in the following areas that impact high quality teaching and learning. (1: Not Prepared, 3: Somewhat Prepared, 5: Highly Prepared)
